# Call the Meeting to Order 7:02pm

<u>Attendees:</u> Brian Payst, Chris Colvin, Debby Filer Makeda Ma'at, Jeff Laufenberg, Jacquelyn Gist, Anita Jones-McNair.

## Approval of the Minutes 7:04pm

Filer moved, Laufenberg seconded. Unanimously approved.

## New Business 7:06pm

Spray park in one of the town parks - Payst

Has the town ever explored? Is it a possibility? Are people interested? Durham has one. Wake County has one. Chapel Hill doesn't have one.

McNair: It was in the original master plan for Dr. MLK Jr Park, financial backing was not there.

When master plan was re-visited, spray park was mentioned briefly, but was not an amenity that reached the design phase that was approved by the council. That's the only time I'm aware it was brought up.

Gist confirmed. They are "not inexpensive." There was also some kind of liability issue. Insurance and/or risk management seems to have been resolved for other jurisdiction. Maybe possible for Twin Creeks Park?

McNair: Not only nextdoor, also a petition. When we've received such feedback, I've shared it with the planning consultant for Carrboro Connects. It might come out through the comprehensive plan. I'll also share with Scott tomorrow.

Laufenberg: How much interest?

McNair: Petition had ~800, they were aiming for 1,000. Different options to deal with water use/conservation issues. Needed for the community on hot days.

Makeda: Anderson Park would be good, too.

Gist: Good for children/ADA accessibility.

McNair: Racial equity tool will also apply to discussions like this.

Colvin: What was the rationale expressed in the petition/nextdoor? Add petition and next door to notes (<a href="https://www.change.org/p/chapel-hill-town-council-build-a-splash-pad-in-chapel-hill">https://www.change.org/p/chapel-hill-town-council-build-a-splash-pad-in-chapel-hill</a>, <a href="https://nextdoor.com/news\_feed/?post=189213647">https://nextdoor.com/news\_feed/?post=189213647</a>). See below. Any temporary cooling stations in the past? Yes. Southern village has spray park? No.

Gist: Misting tents have been purchased—have been put up—helpful for people experiencing homelessness.

McNair: Rec and Parks has a couple and can rent more and deploy them, typically for events, and can do for heat emergencies, too. Pride and Juneteenth. Easy to set up but not really a play feature for kids.

Gist: Sun shelter in dog parks. Friends of Carrboro Rec and Parks funded dog park.

McNair: Commons one cost ~\$15K (middle of the road) 3 or 4 years ago. Friends helped raise money for that one, too.

Filer: Dog park needs water too.

McNair: Got that done this spring! A well was put in.

Payst: Dog water fountain at Dr. MLK Jr Park is great.

McNair: May be some other locations that need sun shades, too. Baldwin park, for instance. No benches either. Just ordered a shade.

Payst: How will decisions be prioritized? Equity tool?

McNair: Using the racial equity tool, liability, etc. Maybe commission could help with prioritization. Friends group would go to council to say what they'd like to raise \$ for. Usually we like to be involved in discussion of the options.

Payst: Is it cheaper to do a pavilion (more permanent) rather than a sun shade?

McNair: Should we invite Parks Project to an upcoming meeting?

Colvin: We've had prior discussion about wanting a general discussion with the Parks Project, so could do that or a specific conversation about shade structures and/or spray park.

Filer: Dog Park is really on accessible by car. Durham has four spraygrounds. Maybe someone from their parks and rec could talk with us?

Payst: Maybe could be a staff to staff discussion?

McNair: They are a lot cheaper than pools. No lifeguards necessary. I will reach out to Susan Stone, Parks Project.

Old Business 7:20 pm

Trails follow-up discussion – Colvin

Colvin: What does the commission want to do on trails?

McNair: Remember that trails are mentioned in the draft comprehensive plan.

Colvin: See Strategy 3.2 (a) specifically: "Support planning and development of a linear park and rustic trail system that preserves much of the natural state while still advancing connectivity goals."

Payst: Town social media was recently promoting trails.

Gist: This commission can take leadership on that. The plan will have hundreds of good ideas. You can push that one.

Payst: Big opportunity for trails is Twin Creeks Park.

Colvin: Do folks want this commission to stay involved in this topic?

Members: Yes.

McNair: Do you all want me to add to the plan that this commission is interested in helping lead?

Colvin: Yes, jointly interested, with the Greenways Commission (if they're also interested).

McNair: At our last meeting, we went line by line. I wanted you all to see what I turned in (see meeting notes). Any comments?

That could be one in their housing community or a private club eg the Exchange Pool, YMCA, UNC club, or the tennis club. Chapel Hill's first pool is the one you refer to and at the time slides, splash pads and such didn't exist. The two indoor swimming facilities are newer and built for swimming, not an afternoon's entertainment. With regard to a water park or splash pad specifically, I believe that these need some form of supervision. Putting one in any outdoor park could invite vandalism or worse. But that's only MHO. Also, there's a question of insurance cost on water parks. The entry fees are high because the liability insurance is high. A public water park is an expensive thing. Look what happened to hot tubs in housing communities in NC.(edited)

There are many more creative designs, but the simple one works just fine.

Splash grounds, water playgrounds or spraygrounds are free and open to the public. Sometimes they are attached to parks, playgrounds or public pools. Chapel Hill and Carrboro are having a growing population and need more recreation places accessible to everyone. Sports like swimming can be a good "afternoon's entertainment", fun for all ages - and are important for staying active and healthy. Playing with or in the water is a good start for toddlers, but can be enjoyed in every stage of live. I like the skater park idea for Carrboro. The new pump track at MLK Jr. is very popular, so why not a skate park, too.

I'm pretty sure a splash pad was just built in Pittsboro. Probably a better bet than traveling to one in Durham. I've never heard of Carrboro planning one.... there isn't even a pool here, anymore.

No, I have not seen one of these. I assumed these were similar to the ones in water parks. I'm old. My kids are adults. I also don't use the public pools during open swim time so I don't know how crowded those are. When my kids were young we belonged to the YMCA and we spent most Sunday afternoons in the pool. Just a plain indoor pool. I certainly agree that swimming is healthy for all ages. As to outdoors, when I was a child and when mine were young we set up sprinklers outdoors on hot days. Water the lawn and kid play in one. I also had a variety of water slides in the yard. Not as pretty as they

have now but the kids could play all day in water with their friends. Just saying that the idea of water play isn't new, just the form. And it continues, last year I saw some parents with water slides set up in an apt complex in CH. The town pools are accessible to all. I believe the entry fee is about \$2. Some of the private pools have sliding scale fees for membership. Express your wishes to the town. I certainly have. Everyone should. They then know what people want.

Thank you for your input. Yes, watering the lawn and letting them play in it is great, and simple, but I know that a lot of people in this area don't have a lawn or space to set up something. I still think an accessible splash pad, water playground, or a water ground fountain would benefit the whole community. Even a small water feature at one of our already existing playgrounds would be an improvement. It could also be a part of one of the new construction projects in Chapel Hill or Carrboro. And make a lot of people happy.

And that was every season at least in the last four, five years. But that is a different topic.

It seems to me that the solution is to put pressure on all those housing development and private pools to do their own lessons. Some of them do have lap lanes, could hire teachers and teach kids at their pool in their own pool. Maybe some do. But I'm sure it would help if more did.
